

Who we are in a picture

A while back we bought the board game called "Logo" and it has become a bit of a family staple for games nights when we're all together and feeling up for a challenge. It works on the principle that you have subconsciously taken in the logos for all sorts of companies and stored them in your brain and that even without the name you will be able to recognise everyone from Birds Eye to Jaguar.

Of course, that is why companies, organisations and charities have logos and why they spend time and money getting it right. Back in the 1980's the Ford Motor Company spent \$ 1 million on rebranding only for the company they had employed to advise them not to change. They took the advice and of course they still use the iconic Ford logo.

Why do I tell you all this?

Because here in the Knightley Benefice we have a new logo which is proudly (and probably to the relief of many) taking the place of my photograph in this issue of the Link magazine.

You will be pleased to know that our logo cost us considerably less than Ford's rebranding exercise (£8.40), however, I hope that it speaks of what we are about as churches in the five parishes of the Knightley Benefice.

Let me explain our logo. We are rural communities and so our logo is based around the image of a tree, but at our heart and centre is the cross of Christ – the Good News that fires and Look closer at the logo online where it is reproduced in full colour and you will see that the tree is full of life which takes us to the beginning and end of God's Word, the Bible, and signifies God's presence amongst his people. The leaves on our tree are varied, different and unique like all of us within our five church fellowships, not

> regimented or uniform. There are also blue leaves reminding us of our baptism where we are welcomed into the family of the Church and begin our Christian journey and red leaves which reflect the tongues of fire from God's Holy Spirit who was given to Christians on the day of Pentecost – the gift of God which is promised to all who turn to Christ so that they might be encouraged and equipped to live for God.

I hope that from now on our new logo will appear more and more in our literature, online presence and publicity to remind all of us of what the Knightley Benefice churches are all about; Christ centred, biblical, Spirit filled places of joy and hope because our tree is not rigid, it is leaning over, not about to fall, but rather it is

leaning over, not about to fall, but rather it is reaching out with the Good News we long for our communities to hear.
