THE RECTOR'S LETTER

Electricity, gas, heating oil, petrol, diesel – it's all rocketed in price. So too has the cost of food, clothing and everyday essentials. Now we are in a situation where families are having to choose between putting the heating on in cold weather or putting food on the table; it seems incredible to imagine such widespread poverty in our society in the 21st century.

Thank goodness we have organisations like the foodbanks to help in these difficult times and you can leave donations for our local Foodbanks at Badby and Newnham churches . But poverty can be more than just financial poverty. 2000 years ago Jesus taught a large crowd of disciples and casual listeners on the side of a hill in northern Israel and one of the things he said there was "Blessed are the poor..." - of course most people who are poor don't feel very blessed; you're not blessed if you can't feed your children, or you are shivering with cold because you can't afford heating or you are stranded by the side of a road with no fuel in the tank because you couldn't afford to fill up the car.

But Jesus didn't mean that, God knows that isn't a blessing, and time and again the Bible calls God's people to help those who are struggling with poverty. On that hillside, Jesus actually said, "Blessed are the poor in spirit," You see, we know when we are poor because we compare ourselves to others who have more — in the 90's the pop group James succinctly put it like this, "If I hadn't seen such riches, I could live with being poor" and spiritually it's good to compare ourselves too, but not with someone who goes to church or the vicar or a bishop — we should compare ourselves with God — how do we match up with him spiritually?

Let's be honest, not well.

If you sat down and looked at your budget and realised that you were spending too much on takeaways or coffee shops or meals out or running an impractical car, you would take

action to stop yourself slipping into poverty. In the same way looking at the holiness of God and then seeing how we match up should make us do a spiritual budget too. But be warned, lots of families out there are in poverty not because they are buying too many takeaways or drinking too much coffee from coffee shops or driving impractical cars, they simply do not have enough money and in the same way we can never make ourselves holy enough to match God, so why does Jesus say, "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven"?

Because knowing that you are poor means recognising that you need help from others; perhaps visiting a foodbank and likewise recognising that you are poor in spirit means recognising that you need God's help. Later on in Matthew's Gospel, Jesus declares "'Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." Easter may be over, but its message remains true, the thing that we might strive for but can never achieve in our own strength; spiritual wealth is given to us freely by Jesus at the Cross. Cast that burden down, stop that futile striving, know peace and rest in Christ.

Recognising and knowing our spiritual poverty allows us to turn to the one who loves to pour out God's riches of grace upon us, who welcomes us, through faith, into the Kingdom of God. So indeed, the poor in spirit are blessed because theirs is the Kingdom of God.

In these difficult times we need to be doing all we can to support those who are struggling inancially and have found themselves facing severe poverty, but how good it is to know that God lifts us out of our spiritual poverty and (as the Bible tells us) places a crown upon our heads, heavenly treasure won for us by Christ.

NEW RAILINGS IN CHURCHYARD

The PCC's decision to install a pedestrian safety fence between the steep drop and the west door of the church is progressing. The fence will be a set of iron railings of an attractive parkland design. There is a narrow path, for safety reasons and to make access to the lower churchvard easier.

Peterborough Diocese has granted a faculty, the planning application is in the hands of West Northamptonshire Planning, where it has been delayed because of staff shortages, the Planning Officer has been out to inspect the site, and was supportive of our needs for improved safety.




