EDITORIAL

Despite the weather (see below) there are many signs of spring in the air. Crocuses and snowdrops are poking up, the temperatures are rising, and the bird song in the morning is wonderful, with the robins and blackbirds especially singing their hearts out. I realise that they are not celebrating the joys of spring, they are just saying to their neighbours "Push off; this is my territory." but nonetheless it is very cheering.

February Filldyke is certainly living up to its name! February 2023 was the driest for many, many years with a grand total of 8.5mm rain in the whole month., whereas this month (and I write on 18th.) we have had 101mm already (including 22mm overnight last night!), with no let-up in sight. The pub was flooded again overnight (thank goodness for the stone floor and no cellar!), but I was told half an hour ago that all would be ready for our Sunday lunch in another couple of hours. Well done!

The memorial service for John Giles last week sent me off on a trip down memory lane for two reasons.

Firstly, John was the first business owner I met in Daventry nearly 54 years ago. After my interview with Danetre Medical Practice (as it then wasn't!) I needed to put petrol in my car ready for the journey back to Ely and of course the partners (George Daley, Colin Graham, and David Boulton) naturally steered me in the direction of John's garage almost next door to the surgery (which is no longer there either). So when, six months later, I arrived to take up the partnership it was John and his colleagues who supplied my fuel and went on to service my cars for many years after that. It was very good to meet again at the service so many of the old faces from Giles' Garage.

Secondly, the service, which was packed to capacity with many familiar faces, also took me back - though nothing like so many years - to times when our churches were much better attended than they are now. During the interregna between Stephen Adams and Michael Pettitt, and then between Michael and Sue Falkner, we ran a system in which by and large there was just one service (a UBS with HC) in the Benefice each week - with the service (and the congregation) moving around the 5 churches in turn. It was very noticeable how good the attendances were during those periods, and, maybe even more valuable, how much better the parishioners knew each other and were willing and able to co-operate and work together for the common good. As we move shortly into another interregnum we might perhaps consider reverting to a similar arrangement at least for the duration of the interregnum. We would all get to know each other better, and more importantly we would not have to make unreasonable calls on the time of the limited number of retired priests available to come to our assistance each Sunday.

Is there something which makes you feel old? Our son recently sent us a photograph of himself nursing a new born child - and telling us that, as the result of one of his wife's family having had a baby, he is now a great-uncle! But I'm not old enough to have a son who is a great-uncle!!!

Somehow the term "great uncle" sounds more ancient even than "grandfather" - and we don't expect him to become that for several years yet!

THE RECTOR'S LETTER

His Mercy is More

I'm a good person.

Well, that's what I tell myself, at least. And most of the time I'm not actually bad, in fact sometimes I can be wonderfully kind, generous and thoughtful. But before you start thinking that I'm getting big headed, I am very well aware that at other times I can be selfish, rude and hurtful. I can feel angry, jealous and all the emotions that I wish I wouldn't and if you're honest with yourself, I suspect that you know this to be true of you as well.

How adept we become at sweeping those inconvenient truths under the carpet – “We're not really sinners,” we argue, “we're just human!” And yet all those things that we seek to pass off as being not really our fault are actually symptomatic of sin. The great twentieth century theologian, John Stott wrote, “Scripture is quite clear that the essence of sin is godlessness. It is the attempt to get rid of God and, since that is impossible, the determination to live as though one had succeeded in doing so.”

But such a life of dreadful denial leads us and our world further and further from the loving creator God who longs for us to know his grace and peace – do you see how it becomes sin? However, although we might try to deny God, it turns out that he loves to claim us as his own and that's where Easter comes in. Easter is how God gave us more than chocolate, or bunnies, he gave us life and hope where we had created death and despair. Through the Cross of Christ and the empty tomb that he rose from, the Bible (or the “Scriptures” as John Stott puts us) tells

us that Jesus wiped away all of our sins – everything that we say and do and think that marks our lives as those lived as though there were no God and in their place he pours out God's love upon us so that we can know life with him in all its fulness, for ever.

What sort of God would treat us with such undeserving kindness? The holy, just, loving and merciful God that we encounter in Jesus. A

recent song by a couple of gifted modern hymn writers is called “His Mercy is More” and the final verse takes us to the sacrifice of Good Friday and the love that we are shown on Easter Day.

“What riches of kindness He
lavished on us;
His blood was the payment,
His life was the cost.
We stood 'neath a debt
we could never afford;
Our sins they are many, His
mercy is more”

This is the truth that we need to own up to; that when we are honest with ourselves, no matter

how good we try to be, “our sins they are many.” But then the greater, more wonderful truth that we are invited to hear and embrace for ourselves is that in Easter we discover that God's mercy is more, isn't that good news? As another modern hymn puts it, “What a love! What a cost! We stand forgiven at the cross.”

POTS & PLANS: WHAT TO DO IN YOUR GARDEN THIS MARCH

My secateurs are sharp. My fork prepared. There's lots to do in the garden in March. Below are my go-to priorities.

1. Seed trays at the ready

Finally it's March. The month listed on so many seed packets for sowing vegetables and flowers. There's lot of choice, of course, but horticultural jeopardy too...

Growing too many seedlings can stress out young plants (and gardeners). Plan your space so seedlings get good light, space, and ventilation, inside and out. I like to stagger seed sowing over spring to give more time and space for each. March is the perfect time for sowing: carrots, broad beans, lettuce, onion (sets too), pea, leaf beet, cauliflower, and broccoli. Plus flowers such as lobelia and salvia.

Garden centres also have a great range of seedlings come spring. Look out for small trays of plants ready for you to pot on or pot out.

2. Is that a weed?

Maybe. It's hard to tell in March. You'll see lots of weeds growing fast, but these can be confused with new shoots from 'herbaceous perennials' which re-grow from ground level each year.

I sometimes delay weeding to avoid damaging existing plants or removing seedlings I might like. It's also useful to look at photos of your garden and planting plans to identify plants and weeds.

But don't delay too long. Every 20 minutes spent weeding in spring is an hour saved in summer! Especially for managing deep rooted perennials. Digging out persistent weeds is also worth the effort early in the year, such removing ground elder. Dig out as much root as possible before the plant 'recharges' its roots in the spring sunshine; then remove any re-growth twice a week. If severe, repeat, and recharge yourself with cake.

3. Finish pruning roses.

For all roses, remove branches which are dead and weak. Then remove unhelpful branches which are

(or likely to) cross/rub with other branches. These removals let air and light into the heart of the plant. This encourages growth and discourages problems. Win win.

For shrub and patio roses, that's it. Time for tea. But for bush and climbing roses, it's also worth cutting longer stems and side-shoots back by a third or half. This encourages stronger growth while controlling the plant's size and shape.

4. Cut the grass

Not the lawn. Rather larger grasses grown for their lovely over-wintering flowers, such as *Miscanthus*, *Molina*, *Pennisetum*. Cut down plants to 2-4 inches from ground level to let the new grass come through cleanly.

You can also tidy up evergreen grasses, such as the many garden varieties of *Carex* and *Festuca*. Gentle pull or cut out untidy growth.

Right, back to my potting shed. My best wishes to you and your garden.

Council Update

The Council met on the 5th February. The key discussion points were the Parish Council website, a proposal to explore a village website for use by organisations within the village, traffic calming and working parties.

Hopefully, by the time you read this, work by WNC related to the **flooding improvement** programme will have commenced. This is scheduled as the first in a multi-phase approach to improve the infrastructure and tackle the causes of the flooding in the village.

We continue to monitor data from the **speed indicator devices** around the village, and to share it with the Police Road Safety Team and the Community Highways Team. We are arranging a site meeting with Highways to look at specific sites of concern, with the initial priority being the Mounts Lane/Weedon Road junction.

The Parish Council has to find a new provider for its website services. Whilst this is of limited interest to most people, it has added impetus to conversations about a **village website** – one which contains information about all the organisations in the village, the activities they provide and upcoming events being organised. Initial discussions with other organisations have been positive, reflecting the benefits of having a single source of information for residents to access. We aim to consult with all organisations in the coming weeks.

Another matter discussed was the creation of **working parties** to deliver projects in the village. The rationale for this is multifaceted. Firstly, 'many hands make light work' and there is a track record of successful working parties doing litter picks, churchyard clearance and putting up marquees for example. Secondly, it enables people who want to help with the upkeep and improvement of the village to contribute, without the commitment of joining the Parish Council. Thirdly, it enables 'us' to progress schemes and deliver tangible benefits much quicker. Working parties could include tree planting, litter picking, churchyard upkeep, website development and traffic calming. If you're interested in getting involved in any of these working parties, or have ideas for other projects, we'd be delighted to hear from you.

The **next Parish Council Meeting is Monday 4th March**, starting at 7.00pm in the Village Hall.
