EDITORIAL

After three and a half years in the Knightley Benefice, the Rector is moving on as he describes in his letter opposite. We wish Malcolm, Liz, Lottie and Ed.all the best for their lives in their new parishes in the diocese of Coventry.

have mentioned previously that we often have hedgehogs coming into the garden to feed during the summer - but this year we have something special. We have an albino hedgehog! This little chap (I hope I haven't mis-gendered him!) first appeared - injured - last autumn in a neighbour's garden . He was taken to the rescue centre at Staverton and having recovered was later returned to them. He was fed for a while and then disappeared for the winter.

He has now emerged from hibernation and has re-appeared; this time in our garden (sorry about that, neighbours!). We have no idea where he lives but he emerges every evening at around 9.00pm and comes to feed in a little shelter we have constructed just outside our kitchen window - sometimes accompanied by another normally coloured hedgehog - and seems to appreciates the food and water we put out. We can clearly see him by the light from the back door, which doesn't appear to disturb him at all.

Albino hedgehogs are apparently very rare (about 1:100,000 according to Mr. Google), which means, given that there are only about 900,000 hedgehogs in the UK, that there are perhaps 9 or 10 albinos in the whole country. Are we not so very fortunate to have such a creature in our midst?

Staying with the wild-life theme, the blue tits along with other birds are very active just now. We have put out our two nesting boxes (complete with cameras) and are waiting to watch them start to make their nests. In the meantime I am sitting at the moment watching a robin working incredibly hard going

backwards and forwards into the hedge outside my study with beaks full of moss And the local woodpecker is making himself heard in no uncertain fashion! ... in between visiting our bird feeder for refreshments!

The cherry trees are in full bloom and an absolutely glorious sight. When the sun shines they are covered in bees, hoverflies, and other assorted flying insects, all looking for, and finding, supplies of food. You can hear their humming from the other side of the lawn. What a wonderful time of the year this is.

dgar Mobbs has sent some further information about this year's rainfall. Writing at the beginning of March he reports that Newnham has had 7.56 ins of rain in the last 2 months, compared with 3.31 ins in 2023. That totals 12.94 ins in 3 months compared with 5.81 ins - so more than double last year! Not good for flooding and farming as he observes. Edgar corresponds with a number of other meteorological observers in the county and it seems that we (and in particular Charwelton) were the wettest place in Northamptonshire in 2023. Aren't we lucky?

THE RECTOR'S LETTER

Moving out - or is that in?

When I was appointed as the vicar of the Knightley Benefice in 2020 (just before the pandemic broke) it was for a three-year period as an Interim Minister. That might seem like a fairly short period but my son is a West Ham fan and around the same time that I was invited to be the vicar here, West Ham also appointed David Moyes as their manager, also for three years – on a "long-term contract", so I suppose it's all relative.

We've loved living in Badby and being part of the Knightley Benefice, the fancy word for this is "incarnational ministry" – living and serving here in our shared community and I shall miss those chats over coffee or whilst out walking the dog when you have shared your lives with me and I with you. It's a pattern that is modelled by God and we see it most clearly at Christmas time when we hear that God's Son to be

born at Bethlehem will be called

Immanuel which means "God with us."

In fact, God never leaves us, but we sometimes struggle to believe it. We are separated from friends and families by job moves, by children growing up or by death and we wonder where is God in such a transient world? The Bible reminds us that God is always with us and points us to a time when he will make everything new. At that time there will be nothing that separates us from our loving creator God and the Message paraphrase of the Bible puts it like this.

"I heard a voice thunder from the Throne: "Look! Look! God has moved into the neighbourhood, making his home with men and women! They're his people, he's their God. He'll wipe every tear from their eyes. Death is gone for good—tears gone, crying gone, pain gone—all the first order of things gone." The Enthroned continued, "Look! I'm making everything new. Write it all down—each word dependable and accurate.""

This message of hope, love, life and reunion comes almost at the end of the Bible – a wonderful conclusion because, of course, the Bible pretty much begins with humanity spoiling our relationship with God and ushering in sin, death and separation. It is an ending

which is actually a new beginning.

The end of our time in Badby is a new beginning in the villages that we are moving to and whilst it might be a new chapter in our family's story and a new chapter for the churches of the Knightley Benefice, the constant is God who is the same yesterday, today and forever – holy, righteous, dependable, loving, gracious and just. No matter where we go or what we

do as individuals, churches, or communities we are in God's heart. He is not a distant God who doesn't care about us, he is the incarnational God – God with us, God who is looking forward to "moving into the neighbourhood" and who won't just be around for three years, ten years or even fifty years but who will be with us for ever.

When Jesus came and lived amongst us his adult ministry only spanned about three and a half years, so, was he our interim God? No, Jesus is our long-term saviour, he was with God the Father at the creation of the universe before we spoilt it and Jesus will reign with God the Father for ever when the promised New Creation, the

restored universe, comes into existence. The best news, though, is that Jesus shares his life with us, knowing us, loving us, even dying for us and rising again.

As I move out of our home and village, please allow me to pass something precious on to you, its an invitation; explore for yourself who this wonderful Jesus is, this God of love and salvation, of kept promises and eternal hope who journeys with us and brings us home to live with our heavenly Father for ever.

I can offer you nothing of greater value and I hope, one day, to bump into you in the new neighbourhood of God, I'll probably be the one with a dog and a mug of coffee.

A YEAR IN THE LIFE OF NEWNHAM CHURCH

After the pandemic the normal service pattern returned, with additional services during the Easter and Christmas seasons. In May there was a service to celebrate the Coronation of King Charles III. The school used the church for a number of services throughout the year and the Mothers' Union for their Advent Carol Service.

Fund raising started again, with a number of events taking place, Snowdrop Day, thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Banks, Classics and Coffee, thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence, NGS Open Gardens, where lunches and teas were served, two Bingo sessions and the final event being Christmas Music with The Knightley Singers. All these events take a great deal of effort and thank you to all who contributed.

A diminishing number of people continue to clean the church and arrange flowers along with the many other housekeeping tasks that keep the church running smoothly and the building functioning. A plea to the village for help raised two responses, we are grateful for these

The church also operates a collection point for the Daventry Food Bank.

It costs approximately £20,000 a year to keep the church running. We are asked to pay a Parish Share of £14,646 to the Diocese of Peterborough but in 2023, we were only able to pay £11,000 of our Parish Share, leaving a shortfall of £3,646. The Parish Share gives us the services of a Priest and access to the Diocese's other support services, e.g. planning and legal matters. Other costs we need to pay include insurance, heat and lighting, security system and fire extinguisher servicing and licences for music. We also needed to purchase extra

signage for the fire extinguishers to make them compliant with current regulations.

We are very grateful to all who support the church through the planned giving scheme and those who come to fund raising events.

We would also like to thank the Parish Council for their work in the churchyard. Mary Wood Churchwarden



POTS & PLANS: WHAT TO DO IN YOUR GARDEN THIS APRIL

Philip Turvil, Garden designer in Badby.

We're off! Garden plants love April with the warm and wet weather. Below are my go-to priorities for this month.

Less is more

In the veg patch, sow little and often to get lots of smaller harvests. It's also nice to harvest young for a snack.

This 'succession' sowing/cropping also gives horticultural insurance if one crop falls foul of a pest or the weather. Leave 3-4 weeks between sowing: carrots, beetroot, lettuce, pea, coriander, rocket, spinach, French beans, radish, mini cabbage, (deep breadth), spring onions, basil, cilantro, dill, kohl rabi, mizuna, Swiss chard... and other crops that are harvestable within a few weeks of sowing.

More is more

Lots of compost is best for seed potatoes planted this month. Space too, with spuds best positioned a 1ft apart in rows 1.5ft apart (ideally more for 'main crop' varieties that grow for longer).

Protect emerging shoots from frost. Then once plants are 9-12 in tall, 'earth-up' by pulling up soil from between rows to partially cover the leaves (leaving 6in. of growth above ground each time). This increases yield if done 2-3 times.

Snip. snip

The moment my secateurs were waiting more. It's time to prune early flowering shrubs as their flowers fade. Prioritise removing dead/damaged and congested growth.

For open-branched shrubs, like forsythia and chaenomeles, thin out or shorten older branches. For denser shrubs, like winter Jasmine and winter heather, trim to your preferred shape. The shrubs will then produce new growth that will flower next winter/spring

The unveiling...

Hardy woody fuchsias reveal all in April. Their top growth is usually killed by winter cold, so it's a tense wait to see what has survived. Hopefully you'll see new growth sprout from lower down branches or the base. Come late April, cut off dead growth and anything else to give a nice shape that's not too concested.

Tie in

Climbers send out long shoots in spring looking for support. Tie in new shoots early to direct their growth where you'd like it. This is much easier when they're still bendy. Remove any surplus shoots.

Untie

Many young trees die when their stakes and ties become too tight. Check your trees 2-3 times a year to ensure stakes and ties are supportive, but not restrictive. Or remove if the tree is robust without support.

Deadhead

Remove faded flowers from bulbs, but leave their foliage to die back naturally. Deadline winter bedding plants too to extend their display and limit self-seeding, especially pansies.

Right, I'm off to do some weeding. My best wishes to you and your garden.



Council Update

The Council met on the 4th March. The key discussion points were the Parish Council website, traffic calming and policy review.

Hopefully, by the time you read this, work <u>will</u> have started on the **flooding improvement** programme, with this phase planned to run from 25th March to 24th April. Communications from Kier, West Northamptonshire Council's partner in this work, have been clear but if anyone has any concerns or comments, we have been advised to contact Customer Services on 0300 126 7000 or 01604 529700.

We continue to monitor data from the **speed indicator devices** around the village and have a site meeting arranged in April with Highways to look at specific sites of concern, with the initial priority being the Mounts Lane/Weedon Road junction.

We considered options to replace the Council's provider of its website services, and will make a final decision at the April meeting. In parallel with this, we have spoken to many organisations in the village about the principle of a **village website**, with the unanimous response being supportive of the idea. An initial meeting has been arranged to get the ball rolling.

This year's grass mowing contract has started. We have opted for weekly cuts until the end of June, and then fortnightly thereafter. There will be a separate strimming contract. If you have questions or concerns about grass cutting in and around the village, please let us know.

Another sign of summer was a request from the Village Hall Management Committee for a license for Music on the Green on 13th July. The request was approved – save the date!

A number of miscellaneous items were also discussed – a new electricity contract for the street lights, street light repair, minor repairs to playground equipment and planning applications.

The next Parish Council Meeting is Monday 8th April, starting at 7.00pm in the Village Hall.
