### PASTORAL LETTER

### Welcome Mary and Joseph to your home this Christmas'

#### **Dear Friends**

When I was in parish ministry, I was delighted to learn about the tradition of the Posada which one village had been running for a number of years. Posada means 'inn' in Spanish and, in Mexico and parts of the United States, an activity has developed when small versions of Mary and Joseph travel around different households in the community and stay there for one night. On Christmas Day, they are brought into church and placed in the crib where they are joined by the baby Jesus. In the small village where I ministered, this had become a beloved tradition and many people joined in.

'Welcome Mary and Joseph to your home this Christmas' is the invitation that is offered to the community and in doing this, people are encouraged to make room for Jesus in a new and creative way.

I wonder what it would be like for you to make room in your home for Jesus this Advent and Christmas – maybe it would be slowing down

and taking time to speak to him; perhaps it is thinking about those in



need in your neighbourhood and finding ways to serve them; you might want to find time to read afresh the words of the prophets in the Old Testament who look ahead to the day that the Messiah will come and live among God's people. Whatever it might look like to you, can I encourage you to invite Jesus into your home, into your heart and into your lives.

## Pots & Plans: what to do in your garden this December

#### Christmas tree

I love to plant a tree on Christmas Day.

Winter is ideal for planting because the soil is moist and most trees are dormant. You'll also find the best selection of trees to buy in winter from garden centres and online.

There's a rich tapestry of tree varieties available with amazing spring and autumn leaf colours and diverse flowers and fruits. Some trees are subtle and compact. Others are boisterous and spreading. So select your tree and its position carefully.

As with all plants, but especially trees, choose a variety that'll also enjoy growing in your soil. The soil in our area is often variations of clay loam, which is pretty helpful for most trees, but do check your soil and get advice if unsure.

And if we do have a white Christmas, delay planting your tree until the ground is thawed and easier to work. Delay planting if your soil is waterlogged too.

Don't want to plant a tree? Perhaps give a gift instead to a friend towards their tree, or donate a charity or parish/town council to help them maintain their existing trees and plant new. The UK has lots of great tree initiatives that need support.

#### Let's talk roses

I love to see roses in gardens. I see lots in my travels when designing and building gardens.

Now's the time to prune roses to remove problem growth and encourage healthy flowering growth.

Start your pruning by removing dead and damaged branches. These dodgy stems are typically paler, may sound hollow, be thin and wibbly, or just broken.

Next, stare at your rose while drinking tea. Spend a moment to mentally follow each branch to see what grows where. Then, cut out branches that are crowding out others, especially those that are (or likely to) to cross/rub against each other. If crowded growths are left in place, they reduce light, airflow, and flowering, so are best removed.

Finally, shorten healthy shoots by a third or a half to retain your preferred shape and encourage more flowers. For climbers, also tie in longer growths to wires or another framework in the direction you want them to grow.

#### Festive harvest?

If you've grown carrots or parsnips for Christmas dinner, cover the ground if frost is forecast. A layer of straw can stop the ground freezing, so will make harvesting easier when wearing your Christmas slippers. Old sacks also reduce freezing.

I also like to store some carrots and parsnips inside, just in case. Store in a dry place at 1-4 degrees Celsius in shallow trays. Put the roots in layers of damp leaf mould, sand, or sieved soil.

Potatoes and onions will also store well if dried off first and kept in a dark and cool place that's frost free. Put spuds inside paper sacks or boxes. Put onions on slatted shelves or hang in nets. And if you have a stray cabbage or two, these store well on shelves in a cool, dark place that's well ventilated.

When storing any fruit or veg, only store produce in good condition and check regularly to remove anything rotten.

#### Council Update

The main items discussed at the November meeting were the budget for the next financial year,websites, Christmas Music on the Green and the 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of VE Day.

As mentioned previously, we need to have the **budget for the next financial year** in place by January, and this year, for the first time, we asked the public and local organisations for their ideas for initiatives which could improve or enhance the village. At a public meeting on the 21<sup>st</sup> October, we received input from the Village Hall Management Committee, the Allotments Association, the Church and the History Society. Whilst it was universally accepted that we live in a beautiful village, it was really positive to hear diverse perspectives and views on how the village can be enhanced. All the suggestions put forward will be considered, but there was one interesting idea which didn't relate to the physical environment, but could improve lives for residents. It was pointed out that appointments at Northampton General Hospital can be a logistical nightmare, especially for people who may not be able to drive or park, with some people resorting to taxis at a cost of £40 each way. Whilst the Parish Council alone cannot solve this problem, the principle of sharing journeys, offering lifts and asking for assistance is something where the wider community, aided by a platform for sharing information, could potentially provide support.

The sense of community in Newnham was evident on **Remembrance Sunday**, at the service beside the War Memorial. It was really well supported and as always made especially poignant by the reading of the names of the men from Newnham who died during the war. Several people commented on the poppies which the Parish Council put on the lampposts. We will add to these next year.

Also, on the theme of community, I would like to highlight the **village website**, which is receiving very positive feedback from all who use it and I would encourage everyone to check it out. It has huge poten tial to connect people and organisations in the village, raise awareness of what's on and also provide topical information and updates. One of the events which will be promoted on this site is the**Christmas Music on the Green**. This is taking place on the **22<sup>nd</sup> December from 5pm**. Like last year, there will be Christmas music, mulled wine from the Romer and Father Christmas might make an appearance. It was a great atmosphere last year, and lovely to exchange season's greetings with folk in the village. The**Christingle service** is taking place in the church **from 3pm that afternoon**.
