

Why was Santa banned from coming down the chimney? Because of his carbon footprints.


What does an English teacher call Santa's little helpers? Subordinate clauses.

Friday 31 January: Where the Crawdads Sing (2022)

Abandoned by her family, Kya Clark, otherwise known to the townspeople of Barkley Cove as the Marsh Girl, is mysterious and wild. "Where the Crawdads Sing" is a coming-of-age story of a young girl raised by the marshlands of the south in the 1950s. When the town hotshot is found dead, and inexplicably linked to Kya, the Marsh Girl is the prime suspect in his murder case.

Saturday 15th February: Giuseppe Verdi's Simon Boccanegra (2002)

The next in our Supper at the Opera series is one of Verdi's less well-known works. Many cognoscenti, however, consider Simon Boccanegra to be the most beautiful of all his operas. It features soaring melodies and ravishing singing from Karita Mattila, Carlo Guelfi and Vincenzo La Scola, under the inspired baton of the Italian maestro Claudio Abbado. The production is directed by the renowned German opera director Peter Stein. [143 mins, Exempt certificate]

Friday 28th Feb: The Great Escaper (2023) Based on the true story of a 90-year-old British WW II Royal Navy veteran who broke out of his nursing home to attend the 70th anniversary D-Day commemorations in France. Starring Michael Caine & Glenda Jackson, it's the final screen performances for both lead actors. "Sweet without straying into sentimentality... thanks to stellar performances from the two leads." [92 mins, 12 cert.]

WEATHER REPORT

My thanks to Edgar Mobbs and June Pound for their annual contributions to our discussion of the weather in our benefice.

Edgar records that the annual total rainfall for Newnham was 41.73 inches or 1060 mms.

This was the second highest annual rainfall total in the last third of a century! 2012 saw 43.33 inches or 1100.5 mms.

We saw the highest ever month's rainfall in September with 8.40 inches followed by April 2012 with 6.71 inches.

Charwelton's experience was broadly similar, though as usual slightly wetter than Newnham at 1069 mm. Likewise Charwelton's wettest year since 1993 was also 2012 when it had 1136mm, while its driest year was 1996 with only 653mm. Charwelton's driest months since 1993 were jointly March 2011 and June 2006 in each of which months we only had 2.5mm.

So far as temperatures are concerned 2024 was fairly run-of-the-mill in Charwelton with a mean maximum temperature of 12.06°C and a mean minimum of 5.84°C - not significantly different from 1993.

The hottest days of 2024 were 25th. June and 27th. August, when the temperature hit 27°C, while the coldest was -9°C on the night of 18 January, with a prolonged cold spell between 19 and 29 November.

Pots & Plans: what to do in your garden this February

Focused pruning

At the end of February, it's time to prune the following plants:

- Cut down deciduous ornamental grasses left standing over winter, such as Miscanthus and Pennisetum. These look great over winter, but the old growth is best removed before it gets tangled with the new spring growth. Cut back all growth to 3-4in from ground level.

- Cut back summer flowering Clematis to enthusiastic buds. Look for healthy buds about 1-2ft from ground level. The plants will re-grow long shoots from spring. It's fun to watch clematis climb up their framework or scramble between border plants. PS – if you have winter or spring flowering Clematis, these don't need much pruning. But if they're getting too big, clip back lightly after flowering.

- Cut back winter-stemmed Cornus (dogwood). These plants have tall red or yellow shoots which look great in winter, but if the shoots are left for too many years, they lose their colour and can overtake a space. The solution is to cut back the coloured stems each year to 1-2ft from ground level. Aim for strong buds on evenly spaced woody branches. This pruning will prompt long new shoots with wonderful colour to enjoy next winter. PS - If you have a newly planted Cornus, wait until the plant is three years old before pruning, and if you have a shorter variety (often the orange stemmed plants), then cut back every three years rather than every year.

- Chop Buddleia down to a woody branch framework 2-3ft from ground level. Then, similar to Cornus, these plants will re-grow tall new shoots. Hard pruning buddleias will produce wonderful flowers on arching branches in summer, as well as controlling the plant size. You can do the same with Sambucus (elder).

- Cut away the old foliage from Epimediums. These wonderful ground cover plants produce spring flowers and often colourful new leaves. So it's best to remove any winter damaged leaves now for the best display in spring.

With this harder pruning, ideally mulch plants too with a 2in. deep layer of compost over the soil surface. Peat-free multi-purpose compost is good. As is homemade compost. Keep compost a bit away from the woody base.

Divide

Divide large clumps of snowdrops and winter aconites after flowering and replant to start new colonies.

February is also a good month to divide congested clumps of herbaceous perennials such as Aster and Phlox. Replant the most vigorous sections.

Potatoes

Garden centres now have seed potatoes in stock. For a robust start and earlier crop, 'chit' your spuds for a few weeks. Simple place them in trays, egg boxes or wire racks in a well-lit, cool place (around 10°C).

Position your spuds with the 'rose end' facing upward. This is the end with the most eyes (little dimples). This is crucial as the shoots will emerge from these eyes. In a few weeks, you'll notice little green shoots. The spuds can then be planted from late March and into April about 12-24in. apart, depending on variety (maincrop varieties need more space).

I also like to protect emerging shoots from frost by throwing over some horticultural fleece on colder nights.

Council Update

Like the December meeting, the January meeting also devoted significant time to discussing the flooding in the village on 24th November, and what the Parish Council can do to support residents and lobby the authorities responsible for tackling the causes of the flooding.

Following the **flooding to homes on Sunday 24th November**, the Parish Council has been communicating with West Northamptonshire Council Highways Department regarding the short term and longer-term actions to avoid a repeat of this incident. West Northamptonshire Councillor Rupert Frost has also been central to the ongoing liaison with the Highways officers. To date, a new drain has been installed to shift surface water from the Badby Road into the brook, hopefully addressing this point of flooding. The Parish Council agreed to establish a Flood Team Working Group to focus on flooding, and co-ordinate the communications with agencies such as West Northamptonshire Council and the Environment Agency and the water companies. The working group has already identified areas where silt and debris need removing from the river where it goes under the Preston Capes Road.

I am pleased to report that we have recruited **a new Councillor.** Gary Niblett joined us at the January meeting and this brings us up to a full complement of eight Parish Councillors. Details of all Councillors are available on the Parish Council website www.newnhamparishcouncil.gov.uk.

Preparations for the **celebration of the 80th Anniversary of VE Day** are beginning to take shape. There will be a Beacon bonfire on Thursday 8th May with a party on the Green on 10th May. Judith Dorkins is once again taking a central role in planning the events, for which we are all grateful, and she will be supported by an event 'team'.

As mentioned previously, I would like to highlight the **village website**, which is receiving very positive feedback from all who use it, so I would encourage everyone who hasn't yet visited it to check it out. The new website has huge potential to connect people and organisations in the village, raise awareness of what's on, as well as provide topical information and updates.
